











LOCAL PARTY COMMITTEES WILL REORGANIZE SOON

There are nearly 900 local party committees registered with our office, and all of them will need to re-organize after the March 3 presidential primary.

Local party committees, after determining their members, are required to file their <u>organizational form</u> in four locations – OCPF, their local election official, the state's Elections Division, and the state party.

WHAT IF A LOCAL ELECTED OFFICIAL WANTS TO RUN IN THE 2020 STATE ELECTION?

Locally elected officials in cities and towns frequently decide to run for an office that e-files with OCPF, such as state representative or senator. In those cases, candidates would organize with OCPF using our <u>on-line organizational system</u>. Other Requirements: (1) submit a "<u>change of purpose</u>" form with the local election official and OCPF (2) submit, to OCPF, the last campaign finance report filed locally (3) when organized with OCPF, a candidate will disclose his or her activity in the <u>depository bank system</u> of reporting, which requires a bank or credit union to file reports for the candidate.
