CAN MUNICIPAL EMPLOYEES PARTICIPATE IN CAMPAIGNS?

The <u>campaign finance law</u> prohibits appointed, compensated public employees from soliciting or receiving money for *any political purpose*. However, teachers, firefighters, police officers and other public employees get involved politically each election cycle.

What can they do? Here are a few examples:

- Public employees can contribute to candidates, up to \$1,000 per calendar year.
- Public employees can hold signs for candidates (on their own time).
- Public employees can host meet and greet campaign events at their homes, so long as there is no fundraising at the event.
- Public employees can support candidates on social media, so long as there's no fundraising.
 For example, a firefighter can use his personal Facebook page to say he is voting for a certain candidate for mayor. He can also encourage others to vote the same way.

NOTE: We recommend that public employees also contact the state's Ethic Commission prior to participating in campaigns.
