

2020 STATE ELECTION

Until November, OCPF's primary focus will be on assisting candidates and ballot question committees appearing on the 2020 state election ballot.

Local election officials are not directly involved with the campaign finance tasks associated with the state election, but we thought it may be helpful to share our

- 2. We may reach out to you for contact information about state candidates from your community who have not yet organized with OCPF.
- 3. If a new state candidate previously held a municipal office, OCPF may contact you for the most recent campaign finance report filed with your office.
- 4. NEW: Campaign finance activity by House and Senate candidates is updated by the 5th of each month, and is available on our website by clicking here. The 2020 filing schedule is different from past state elections, when House and Senate candidates filed eight days before the primary and general elections.
