The post-election report is due 30 days after the election.

Towns: Post-Election Reports

If your unsuccessful 2022 town candidates have a zero balance on their "30 day after election" reports, and no liabilities, you can consider them dissolved. They will not need to file the year-end report.

All of your winners, other incumbents, and unsuccessful candidates with balances, will file the year-end report in January, 2023.

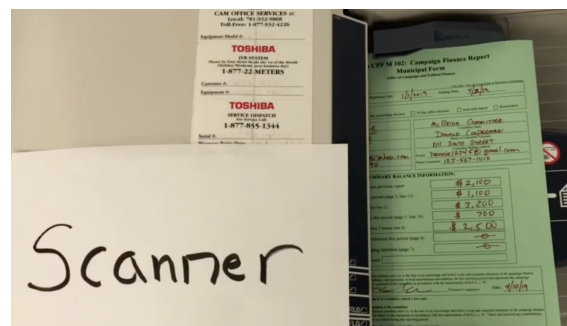
Posting reports to your municipal websites

Posting one? Post them all.

We've noticed a trend at OCPF: more residents are asking for campaign finance reports on the town and city levels, and they expect to see the reports on the municipal clerk websites.

We strongly suggest that if you post one report to your municipal website, please post them all.

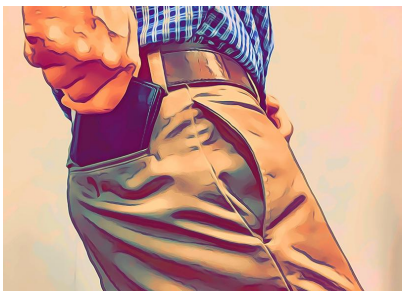
RULES
