## Statewide candidates raise \$10.8 million in first quarter of state election year

Candidates for governor topped the list of statewide candidate fundraising totals for the first quarter of 2026, led by three Republicans and the Democratic incumbent Maura Healey.

Michael Minogue of Hamilton was the top fundraiser for the quarter, raising \$7,555,927 since January. He is followed by Healey, an Arlington resident, at \$1,214,796, Brian Shortsleeve of Barnstable at \$646,493, and Mike Kennealy of Lexington at \$438,925.

Among all statewide candidates, \$10,841,488 was raised in the first quarter of this year by 26 candidates running for governor, lieutenant governor, attorney general, treasurer, secretary and auditor. Candidates with no banking activity are not included in these totals.

Statewide candidates typically raise tens of millions of dollars each election cycle. In 2022, \$33.2 million was raised by 27 candidates. The all-time fundraising record was set in 2006, when statewide candidates reported raising \$51.5 million. Fundraising totals, for some candidates, include funds donated by the candidates personally to their own campaigns.

In the last statewide election in 2022, Healey led all gubernatorial candidates with \$6.2 million in fundraising, over the 2021-22 election cycle.

All statewide candidates are in the depository system of campaign finance disclosure, which requires each campaign to partner with a bank to file disclosure reports on their behalf. Reports are filed each month by the bank, showing the total deposits for the previous month, and itemizing each expenditure. Banks are able to track monthly expenditures because candidates use their committee checks and debit cards to make expenditures. Details about individual contributors are disclosed by the candidate committees, by the fifth of each month.

The primary election is set for Sept. 1, with the general election following on Nov. 3.
