

# Massachusetts Office of Campaign and Political Finance

2015 Mayoral Spending Study

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#### INTRODUCTION

This study examines campaign finance activity by candidates for mayor in municipal elections throughout Massachusetts in 2015. The Office of Campaign and Political Finance (OCPF) began issuing mayoral studies after the 1997 city elections. OCPF devotes considerable attention to municipal races, both by providing guidance and workshops to candidates and working closely with local election officials to help ensure compliance with the campaign finance law.

All mayoral candidates in the state e-filed campaign finance reports with OCPF in 2015. Mayors in Boston, Everett, Lawrence, Newburyport, Newton, Northampton and Salem were not up for re-election in 2015 and are not included in this report.

The information contained in this study is based on data compiled from campaign finance reports filed by 61 mayoral candidates in the 36 cities that held mayoral elections in 2015. The study is limited to those candidates who were on the ballot in the November elections in cities and does not include those who were eliminated in preliminary elections.

The totals for most of the finalists listed here include activity for all of calendar year 2015. Activity for some first-time candidates, however, started only after the commencement of their campaigns later in 2015.

In cities with populations of less than 75,000, the first report was due eight days before the preliminary and only if the candidate's name appeared on the preliminary ballot. The second report was due eight days before the general election (in 2015, that due date was Oct. 26). All candidates and committees were required to file year-end reports on Jan. 20, 2016, disclosing activity through Dec. 31, 2015.

Candidates in cities with populations of more than 75,000 have campaign finance accounts with banks that file reports directly with OCPF twice monthly.

Some mayoral candidates in this report may have also held another elected office, such as city councilor, and activity by their committees may also include activity related to that office.

OCPF has taken steps to ensure that the information contained in this report is accurate as of the time of its compilation. The information used for this report does not reflect amendments filed by candidates subsequent to the original filings. In addition, the information provided by candidates and committees may have contained some minor balance inconsistencies.

OCPF is an independent state agency that administers Massachusetts General Laws Chapter 55, which provides for disclosure and regulation of campaign finance activity by candidates for state, county and municipal office.

#### **FINDINGS**

Voters in 36 cities in Massachusetts went to the polls to elect their mayors in 2015. Twenty-four of those 36 mayoral finals were contested, one fewer than in 2013. Of those contested races, 20 featured incumbents running for re-election and four featured contests for open seats (there were three open seats in 2013).

A total of 61 candidates were on the ballot in November, including 32 incumbents, 12 of whom were unopposed for re-election. Incumbents were defeated in Fall River, Pittsfield, Revere and Weymouth.

The mayors who won election in November 2015 were 28 returning incumbents and eight newcomers.

The mayoral campaign finance activity in brief:

- The 61 mayoral candidates raised \$3,692,411 and spent \$3,786,953 in 2015, according to their reports. The spending and fundraising records were set in 2013, when there was an open seat for mayor in Boston. The 63 mayoral candidates in 2013 raised \$8,508,820 and spent \$8,839,321.
- The median amount of fundraising by mayoral candidates in 2015 was \$34,895, while the median spending figure was \$30,782. In 2013, the figures were \$34,626 and \$32,964, respectively. (A median represents the exact midpoint of all 61 totals: half were higher and half were lower.). The fundraising median in recent mayoral studies has been about \$30,000. The spending median has fluctuated from a low of \$23,388 in 1999 to a high of \$33,040 two years later.
- Eleven candidates raised more than \$100,000 in 2015 (eight in 2013), and 10 spent more than \$100,000 (nine in 2013).
- The top spender in the 24 contested elections won 18 times, or 75 percent of the contests.
- Six candidates outspent their opponents and lost in Fall River, Gloucester, Holyoke, Revere, Waltham and West Springfield.
- The race with the highest spending in 2015 was Quincy, where Mayor Thomas Koch and former Mayor William Phelan reported total expenditures of \$861,009. The city with the second highest expenditure total in 2015 was Revere at \$332,451. The race with the

highest spending in 2013 was Boson, where Mayor Martin Walsh and former Boston City Councilor John Connolly reported total expenditures of \$6,020,548, a record.

- The top fundraiser among mayoral candidates in 2015 was Thomas Koch of Quincy, who raised \$552,762. The fundraising record was set in 2013 when Martin Walsh of Boston raised \$3,004,406, surpassing the previous record of \$1,518,353 set in 2009 by former Boston Mayor Thomas Menino.
- Koch also topped the spending list at \$687,687 in 2015. Walsh topped the spending list in 2013 with \$3,015,209, breaking the record set in 2009 by Menino, who spent \$2.7 million.
- The average amount spent per vote by a candidate in 2015 was \$12.93. The record was set in 2013 when 20.96 was spent per vote. The previous record was \$16.52 set in 2009.

Comparisons to figures from other years are difficult, due to such factors as turnover of candidates and the fact that not all cities hold mayoral elections every two years.

A significant factor in any study of mayoral spending is whether Boston is included. The largest city in the state, Boston elects its mayor every four years and has generated the greatest amount of campaign finance activity by far each time it is included in this study. There was no Boston mayoral election in 2015.

The findings in more detail:

#### **Most Active Races**

The greatest amount of spending for a mayoral race in 2015 was in Quincy, where Mayor Thomas Koch and William Phelan reported spending a total of \$861,009. In the second slot, Revere candidates reported \$332,451 in expenditures.

The record for a race was set in 2013 in Boston, where Martin Walsh and John Connolly reported spending a total of \$6,020,548.

Thirteen cities saw combined spending of more than \$100,000 by finalists. The total was 11 in 2013.

Amesbury had the least amount of spending (\$3,776) in cities with contested mayoral elections. The total was spent by incumbent Mayor Kenneth Gray. His opponent, Ronald Wood, did not spend any money.

#### **Top Fundraisers**

Quincy's Koch was the top fundraiser in 2015 with \$552,762 in receipts. The record was set in 2013 by Boston's Walsh, who raised \$3,004,406. The previous fundraising record was \$1,518,353 set in 2009 by Boston's Menino.

The opposed candidate who raised the least amount of money and won was Mayor Kenneth Gray of Amesbury, who defeated Ronald Wood. Grey reported \$4,855 in receipts.

#### **Top Spenders**

Quincy's Thomas Koch topped the spending list at \$687,687 in 2015.

The record was set in 2013 when Boston mayoral winner Martin Walsh reported \$3,015,209 in expenditures, breaking the record set in 2009 by Menino, who spent \$2,676,589. Walsh's opponent in 2013, John Connolly, also exceeded Menino's record with \$3,005,339 in expenditures.

Seven of the top spenders were incumbents, five of whom won their elections. Five of the top ten spenders were winners in November.

The opposed candidate who spent the least and won was Mayor Gray of Amesbury, who reported \$3,736 in expenditures.

#### **Per-Vote Spending**

Mayoral candidates on average spent \$12.93 per vote in 2015. In 2013, during a contested and open Boston mayoral race, candidates on average spent \$20.96 per vote, a record.

Mayor Thomas Koch of Quincy had the highest per-vote average in 2015, \$55.35. Koch broke the previous record of \$54.33 set by Everett Mayor Carlo DeMaria in 2013.

The top ten list of per-vote spenders includes six incumbents, four of whom won re-election. There were six losing candidates in the top 10.

The winning, opposed mayoral candidate with the smallest per-vote total was Mayor Kenneth Gray of Amesbury, whose per-vote total was \$2.06. His opponent, Ronald Wood, made no expenditures.

The Amesbury election between Gray and Wood recorded the smallest amount per vote in a contested race, \$1.91.

Quincy recorded the greatest number of votes cast, 22,040, followed by Worcester (19,172) and Fall River (15,889).

#### **Success Rate for Top Spenders**

Traditionally, the candidate who spends the most money wins. The top spender in the 24 contested elections won 18 times, or 75 percent of the contests.

#### Past years:

- 2013: The top spender won 80 percent of the time.
- 2011: The top spender won 86 percent of the time.
- 2009: The top spender won 71 percent of the time.
- 2007: The top spender won 64 percent of the time.
- 2005: The top spender won 72 percent of the time.
- 2003: The top spender won 68 percent of the time.
- 2001: The top spender won 79 percent of the time.

Six candidates outspent their opponents and lost in Fall River, Gloucester, Holyoke, Revere, Waltham and West Springfield.

#### **Winners**

Typically, winning candidates as a whole raise and spend more than those who lose. In 2013, winners spent twice as much, according to the median. However, in 2015, the median expenditure total for winners was \$30,469, compared to \$30,950 for unsuccessful candidates.

Average expenditures for winning candidates was \$65,388 in 2015, compared to \$57,179 for unsuccessful candidates.

#### Opposed vs. Unopposed

Candidates with opposition had more campaign finance activity than those who did not face an opponent in 2015.

The 49 opposed candidates accounted for 89 percent of the total spent (94 percent in 2013). The 12 unopposed candidates were all incumbents.

Mayor Joseph Curtatone of Somerville spent \$207,607, topping the list of unopposed incumbents. He also topped the unopposed spending lists in 2011 and 2013.

#### **Open seats**

A total of four mayoral races in 2015 did not feature incumbents (Fitchburg, Medford, West Springfield and Westfield), an increase of one from 2013. There were 10 open seats in 2011.

In three of the four open seats, the candidate who spent the most won. The exception was in West Springfield, where William Reichelt spent \$40,966 and defeated Michael Finn, who reported \$51,718 in expenditures.

#### **Incumbents**

More than half of all 2015 mayoral finalists were incumbents (32 incumbents and 29 non-incumbents).

The median expenditure total for incumbents was \$25,852, far below the median of \$44,392 for non-incumbents. However, incumbents accounted for most of the spending, \$2,354,963 to \$1,431,990. Incumbents also had much higher average expenditures, \$73,592 to \$49,378.

In 2013, there were 33 incumbents and 30 non-incumbents.

#### **Starting and ending balances**

The 61 mayoral candidates reported starting their 2015 campaigns with a total of \$1,571,187 on hand. In 2013, 63 candidates started with \$1.8 million.

The candidate with the highest amount on hand in 2015 was Joseph Curtatone of Somerville with \$206,030, followed by Robert Hedlund of Weymouth, with a balance of \$143,241. Hedlund was an incumbent senator when he ran for mayor.

In 2013, John Connolly of Boston had the highest starting balance, \$252,028. Connolly was an incumbent city councilor when he ran for mayor.

Sixteen candidates reported starting their 2015 campaigns without any money (zero balance), and none were incumbents. Of that number, three were ultimately elected mayor in Medford, West Springfield and Revere.

Mayoral candidates reported finishing the 2015 election season (Jan. 1 to Dec. 31) with a total of \$1,354,578 on hand. Joseph Curtatone of Somerville ended the year with the largest ending balance, \$200,325, followed by incumbent New Bedford Mayor Jon Mitchell with \$156,002.

The winning candidate with the lowest ending balance was Stephanie Muccini Burke of Medford with \$37.

Four candidates from Amesbury, Leominster, Gardner and Medford reported ending balances of zero or negative.
