## INTRODUCTION

This study examines campaign finance activity undertaken by candidates for the Massachusetts Senate and House of Representatives (known collectively as The General Court) in calendar year 2010. The Office of Campaign and Political Finance has issued a report of this type after every state election since 1990.

The information contained in this legislative study is based on data for 2010 compiled from campaign finance reports filed by candidates and treasurers of political committees organized on behalf of candidates for the Massachusetts Senate and House. In 2010, a total of 433 candidates sought legislative office and filed disclosure reports with OCPF: 95 running for the Senate and 338 seeking a House seat.

Legislative candidates and their committees are required to file three campaign finance reports disclosing election year financial activity. The reports are due with OCPF eight days prior to the September state primary election; eight days prior to the November general election; and on January 20 of the year immediately following. Reports were due from the candidates in this study on Sept. 7, 2010, Oct. 25, 2010, and Jan. 20, 2011.

Starting in 2002, legislative candidates began filing their campaign finance reports in electronic form to an OCPF server, which immediately posts the information on the office Web site at [www.mass.gov/ocpf](http://www.mass.gov/ocpf) (a minimal number of candidates file paper reports if they do not exceed an aggregate of \$5,000 in receipts and expenditures in a two year election period).

Candidates and committee treasurers are required to disclose on those reports their account balances at the beginning of each reporting period; receipts and expenditures for the reporting period; in-kind contributions for the reporting period; and all liabilities.

The campaign finance law allows legislative candidates and committees to make expenditures for “the enhancement of the political future of the candidate,” as long as the expenditure is not primarily for the personal use of a candidate or any other person.

OCPF has taken steps to ensure that the information contained in this study is accurate as of the time of its compilation, the spring of 2011. This study takes into account many corrections, additions or deletions made by candidates as a result of any review conducted by OCPF or amendments filed by candidates or political committees. Nevertheless, the information used for this study does not reflect subsequent amendments. In addition, the information provided by candidates and committees may include some balance inconsistencies. Finally, annual comparative data are not adjusted for inflation.

The Office of Campaign and Political Finance (OCPF) is an independent state agency that administers Massachusetts General Law Chapter 55, the campaign finance

law. The law provides for disclosure and regulation of campaign finance activity on the state, county and municipal levels. The reports filed by state and county candidates and committees are available on the office's web site at [www.mass.gov/ocpf](http://www.mass.gov/ocpf). Mayoral and city council candidates in cities with populations of more than 100,000 file with OCPF, as well as mayoral candidates in cities with populations between 40,000 and 100,000. In the case of candidates and committees that file paper reports with OCPF, those documents are available for public inspection at OCPF's office at the John W. McCormack Building, One Ashburton Place, Boston.

## OVERVIEW

Receipts and expenditures for legislative candidates increased in 2010 compared to the last state election in 2008, and fell short of the record-setting figures in 2004. **Total fundraising** for the 433 legislative candidates in 2010 reached nearly \$15 million, \$2.5 million more than in 2008 when 311 candidates ran. **Expenditure** totals in 2010 increased to \$16.9 million, 34 percent more than in 2008. The 2010 expenditures total fell short of the 2004 record of \$17.6 million by \$803,454.

Of the 433 legislative candidates in 2010, 95 were seeking one of 40 Senate seats and 338 were running for the 160-seat House.

Of the 200 legislative races, 118, or 59 percent, were contested by more than one candidate in either the primary or general election. There were 47 more contested races in 2010 than in 2008.

The 433 legislative candidates were comprised of 166 incumbents, or 38.5 percent of the total number of contenders. Incumbents made up 59 percent of the field in 2008.

The number of candidates in 2010 was the highest since 1992. The lowest total ever recorded in OCPF studies, which have been compiled after each election since 1990, was 311 in 2008. The highest number of legislative candidates recorded in an OCPF study was 507 in 1990.

All but 13 incumbents in 2010, or 92 percent, were re-elected. The 13 unsuccessful incumbents were all in the House. The 6<sup>th</sup> Worcester District race was not decided in November, and its incumbent, Rep. Geraldo Alicea, is counted among the 13 unsuccessful incumbents.<sup>1</sup>

Forty-six new legislators were elected – eight in the Senate and 38 in the House.

<sup>1</sup> A special election was held on May 10, 2011, to fill the 6<sup>th</sup> Worcester District seat. The winner was Peter Durant of Spencer. Campaign finance activity for the special election period is not included in this study.

The findings for each of the two chambers of the Legislature are broken down in each of the two sections that follow this introduction.

## SECTION I: THE SENATE

Average receipt totals decreased compared to the 2008 election. Senate candidates on average raised \$63,863 in 2010, down from \$74,311 in 2008. Average expenditures increased to \$77,081 in 2010, up from \$74,883 in 2008.

Eleven incumbents were unopposed, down from 27 in 2008, the highest ever recorded in an OCPF study. The remaining 29 races in 2010 featured 84 candidates.

Of 32 incumbents on the ballot, all returned to office. Eight new senators were elected to fill open seats.

Expenditures do not include debts incurred that had not been paid at the end of 2010.

Total receipts do not include in-kind contributions, which are things of value other than money. Senate candidates reported receiving \$545,349 in in-kind contributions in 2010.

Overall totals in both receipts and expenditures increased in 2010. The 2010 fundraising total of \$6.1 million was 41 percent greater than in 2008, when there were 37 fewer candidates. The expenditure total of \$7.3 million in 2010 was a 67 percent increase over 2008.

A total of 95 candidates ran for the Senate in 2010, an increase of 64 percent from the 58 candidates in 2008. The Senate that was seated in January 2011 was made up of 36 Democrats and four Republicans.

The findings in greater detail:

## **I. Success of Campaigns**

Winning candidates spent more money than their opponents. On average, Senate winners outspent unsuccessful candidates \$130,999 to \$37,868.

In the 29 contested Senate races, the candidate who spent the most money won in all but four races, or 86 percent of the time. Candidates who won their race and were outspent were Eileen Donoghue of Lowell, Susan Fargo of Lincoln, Cynthia Creem of Newton and John Keenan of Quincy.

The average amount spent by unsuccessful candidates decreased in 2010 from two years earlier to \$37,868, down from \$43,897. Average receipts in 2008 also decreased for unsuccessful candidates in 2010 to \$36,127, down from \$41,850.

## **II. Incumbency**

Senators seeking to return to office accounted for the majority of the total receipts and expenditures.

Averages for expenditures were up for incumbents and down for non-incumbents compared to 2008. The 32 incumbent senators on the ballot spent \$102,936 on average, a 29 percent increase from 2008. The 63 non-incumbents in 2010 reported expenditures of \$63,949 on average, down from \$66,553 in 2008.

Historically, some expenditures by incumbents are not necessarily related directly to their election campaigns (such as bumper stickers or advertisements), but were geared toward constituent or legislative expenses. The campaign finance law allows campaign funds to be used for expenditures such as maintaining a district office, charitable contributions and official or political travel.

**III. Party Affiliation**

Democrats, who accounted for the majority of Senate candidates in 2010, had higher average receipt and expenditure totals than Republican candidates.

There were 52 Democrats on the ballot in 2010, an increase of 10 from 2008. Democrats accounted for 83 percent of funds raised and 85 percent of expenditures. Two years before, the party's share was 85 percent of receipts and expenditures.

There were 36 Republicans on the ballot, an increase of 23 from 2008, accounting for 38 percent of all candidates. The GOP's share of receipts was 16 percent, an increase from 15 percent in 2008. The party's expenditures made up 14 percent of the total, a decrease of one percent from 2008.

Seven Senate candidates were not affiliated with political parties.

#### **IV. Contested and Uncontested Races**

On average, the 84 opposed candidates reported higher receipts and expenditures in 2010 compared to 11 unopposed candidates.<sup>1</sup> Candidates in contested races accounted for 92 percent of the total receipts and 93 percent of total expenditures; the corresponding figures in 2008 were 54 and 55 percent, when there were only 31 opposed candidates.

The average amount raised by an opposed candidate in 2010 decreased by 13 percent, while the expenditure average was up 4 percent. Averages for unopposed candidates were down in 2010, reflecting a drop of 68 percent in average receipts and a decrease of 50 percent in average expenditures.

#### **CONTESTED SEATS**

Twenty-nine of the 40 seats for the Senate in 2010 were contested (races with more than one candidate). Of those 29 races, eight were for seats being vacated by outgoing senators.

Six of the eight races for open seats were among the most expensive contested Senate elections in 2010, and all had two or more candidates.

<sup>1</sup> Some studies of legislative races have used other criteria in determining whether a race was “contested” or whether an incumbent was “opposed,” looking at such factors as whether the winner exceeded a certain margin of victory or whether an opponent had any campaign finance activity. This study considered a race contested if there were two or more candidates for the seat, regardless of the outcome or the level of campaign finance activity.

## **V. Starting Balances**

Candidates for the Senate reported having a total of \$4,157,359 on hand at the start of 2010, \$662,856 less than the 2008 figure.

Incumbents accounted for most of the money on hand at the start of 2010, as in previous years. Incumbent senators at the start of the election year who ran for re-election reported having 86 percent of the total available at the start of the election year. Non-incumbents started with a total of \$598,310. The comparable percentage for the incumbents' share in 2008 was 95.6 percent. The average amount on hand in an incumbent's account at the start of the year was \$111,220, while the average held by a non-incumbent was \$9,496, slightly below the 2008 average of \$9,559.

The starting balance figures have traditionally favored incumbents because many challengers are first-time candidates who begin their campaign with a zero balance and start their campaigns during the election year.

A total of 32 candidates, all non-incumbents, reported having no campaign funds on hand at the start of the year. Of the 32, one was elected (Daniel Wolf of Harwich). The 98 Senate candidates who have started an election year with a zero balance since 2004 have had limited success. In four elections since 2004, only three Senate candidates started the election year with a zero balance and won.

The Senate candidate with the highest starting balance was Sen. Mark Montigny of New Bedford, who reported a total of \$1,202,349. Montigny was also first in 2008, 2006 and 2004. Only two Senate candidates have reported election-year starting balances of more than \$1 million (Montigny, and Senate President Thomas Birmingham, who started 2000 with \$1.1 million).

Twelve of 95 Senate candidates reported starting balances of more than \$100,000, five fewer than in 2008.

The candidates with the 10 largest starting balances in 2010 shared at least two characteristics: each was an incumbent and each was re-elected. All were Democrats except Robert Hedlund, R-East Weymouth.

## **VI. Most Active Candidates and Races**

The race that featured the highest expenditure total in 2010 was Middlesex & Essex District, where three candidates sought an open seat (incumbent Richard Tisei ran for lieutenant governor). The winner, Katherine Clark, an incumbent state representative, reported the highest expenditures in the race.

The ten races below accounted for \$4,215,602, or 57 percent of the total expenditures by Senate candidates in 2010. The comparable percentage in 2008 was 57 percent.

The highest amount ever spent for a Senate race was \$809,637 in 2002, when three candidates were vying for an open seat in the Middlesex, Suffolk and Essex District. The winner was Jarrett Barrios, D-Cambridge.

The least expensive contested Senate race in 2010 was in the 2<sup>nd</sup> Middlesex District, where incumbent Patricia Jehlen, D-Somerville, and David Carnevale, R-Medford, reported spending \$45,145.

### **TOP FUNDRAISERS**

The list of the 10 Senate candidates who raised the most money in 2010 comprised two incumbents, and all but one were Democrats.

Seven candidates in the top 10 fundraisers were successful in their campaigns.

The top fundraiser in 2010, Daniel Wolf, was seeking an open Cape & Islands seat. In 2008, the top fundraiser was Senate President Therese Murray, who raised

\$360,158. The highest amount ever raised by any Senate candidate in an election year was \$1.358 million by Thomas Birmingham in 2000, who was unopposed. The highest amount ever raised by an opposed Senate candidate in an election year was the \$364,973 reported by Senate President Therese Murray in her successful campaign in 2004.

All but two of the 95 Senate candidates reported raising funds in 2010. The winning candidate who raised the least was unopposed incumbent Richard Ross, R-Wrentham, who raised \$9,550. The winning opposed candidate who raised the least was Steven Baddour, D-Methuen, who reported receipts of \$21,564.

### **TOP EXPENDITURE TOTALS**

Sen. Therese Murray, D-Plymouth, topped the expenditure list in 2010 with \$451,582 in disbursements. Murray set the record amount of \$474,095 in 2004.

All candidates on the top 10 expenditure list faced opposition, and six candidates on the top 10 list were elected. The expenditure list includes one Republican, Craig Spadafora, who ran in the Middlesex & Essex District that was won by Katherine Clark.

Expenditures were reported by all but three Senate candidates (Patrick O'Connor, D-Lowell; George Saade, R-Bridgewater; and Kimberly Roy, R-Sutton).

The opposed candidate who spent the least and won was Sen. Patricia Jehlen, D-Somerville, who reported \$29,138 in expenditures. Her opponent was David Carnevale, R-Medford, who reported \$16,006 in expenditures.

The unopposed candidate who spent the least was Sen. Bruce Tarr, R-Gloucester, who reported \$13,204 in expenditures.

The record amount spent by all Senate candidates was \$7,620,649 in 2004.

### **VII. Ending Balances**

Candidates for the Senate reported ending 2010 with \$2,871,752, about 66 percent lower than the 2008 ending balance total. The record high of \$4.9 million was posted in 2000.<sup>2</sup>

The candidate with the greatest amount of money on hand was Sen. Mark Montigny with a total of \$1,173,294. That amount is second to the record of \$2.2 million held by Senate President Thomas Birmingham in 2000.

As was the case in every election year since 1998, the candidates with the ten highest ending balances in 2010 were all incumbents and all had been re-elected.

Incumbents accounted for a total of 98 percent of all funds on hand at the end of the year, all but \$51,089. The winning candidate who finished with the smallest amount was Sal DiDomenico, D-Everett, who showed an ending balance of \$32.

## SECTION II: THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES

The number of state representative candidates in 2010 was the highest in 18 years.

A record was broken in 2010. House Speaker Robert Deleo raised \$462,596, the highest amount reported by a House candidate in an OCPF study.

Total receipts and expenditures eclipsed the 2008 election, but average receipts and expenditures fell in 2010.

A total of 338 candidates sought election to the House in 2010, an increase of 85 from 2008. The largest number of House candidates recorded in an OCPF study was 401 in 1990. Of the 160 House seats, 94 were sought by more than one candidate.

A total of 134 incumbents ran for re-election and reported spending nearly twice as much than non-incumbents, on average.

The new House that took office in January 2011 was composed of 38 new representatives. A total of 128 are Democrats and 31 are Republicans. One race was undecided between incumbent Democrat Geraldo Alicea and Republican challenger Peter Durant. A special election was scheduled for May 10, 2011 to fill the seat.

## I. Winners vs. Losers

Winning candidates comprised 47 percent of the field and accounted for 66 percent of spending. Winners outspent unsuccessful candidates two to one, on average.

The average expenditure and receipt totals for winning candidates decreased from 2008: 18 and 13 percent, respectively.

Twenty-one candidates were outspent in 2010 but still won their races:

Falmouth, George Ross of Attleboro, Shaunna O'Connell of Taunton, Steven Howitt of Seekonk, Donald Wong of Saugus, James Lyons of Andover, Daniel Webster of Pembroke, Geoff Diehl of Whitman, Angelo D'Emilia of Bridgewater, Kimberly Ferguson of Holden, Richard Bastien of Gardner, Kevin Kuros of Uxbridge, Ryan Fattman of Sutton, and Nick Boldyga of Southwick.

The average spent by unsuccessful candidates decreased by \$869 from 2008, while receipts fell by \$898.

## II. Incumbents vs. Challengers

Non-incumbents outnumbered incumbents 204 to 134 in 2010, but incumbents accounted for a majority of the receipts and expenditures. The 134 incumbent representatives seeking re-election made up 53 percent of receipts and 56 percent of expenditures. The comparable figures in 2008 were 69 and 68 percent, respectively.

On average, expenditures increased 4 percent for incumbents compared to 2008 figures, and receipts decreased 7 percent. For non-incumbents, average receipts dropped 14 percent and expenditures fell 16 percent.

The 2010 election saw 13 incumbent representatives lose their bids for re-election, 11 more than in 2008.

Historically, many expenditures made by incumbents, both unopposed and opposed, are not necessarily related directly to their campaigns (such as bumper stickers or advertisements), but were geared toward constituent or legislative expenses. The campaign finance law allows campaign funds to be used for expenditures such as maintaining a district office, charitable contributions and official or political travel.

**III. Party Affiliation**

Democrats were the dominant party in terms of receipts and expenditures in 2010. The 204 Democrats represented 60 percent of those running for House seats and accounted for 75 percent of the total expenditures in 2010. In 2008, the party made up 77 percent of candidates and 81 percent of expenditures.

The 98 Republicans running in 2010 (59 more than in 2008) made up 29 percent of the candidate roster and 23 percent of the total expenditures. Unenrolled candidates accounted for less than 3 percent of total expenditures.

Average expenditures for Democrats in 2010 remained relatively flat compared to 2008, but dropped 32 percent for Republicans. Average receipts in 2010 for Democrats decreased by 6 percent compared to 2008, and fell 28 percent for Republicans.

**IV. Contested and Uncontested Races**

There were 66 House races in 2010 that featured unopposed candidates, 36 fewer than in 2008. The 102 unopposed races in 2008 was the highest number recorded since OCPF began studying legislative campaign finance activity in 1990 (the previous high was 100 recorded in 2006).

The remaining 94 races in 2010 were contested, featuring two or more candidates.<sup>1</sup>

<sup>1</sup> Some studies of legislative races have used other criteria in determining whether a race was “contested” or whether an incumbent was “opposed,” looking at such factors as whether the winner exceeded a certain margin of victory or whether an opponent had any campaign finance activity. This study considered a race contested if there were two or more candidates for the seat, regardless of the outcome or the level of campaign finance activity.

## **CONTESTED SEATS**

Candidates who were opposed in 2010 outspent unopposed candidates as a group. In the 94 contested House races, the candidate who spent the most money won 73 times, a success rate of 78 percent.

The 94 contested races in 2010 consist of two categories: contests for open seats and those featuring incumbents seeking re-election. Twenty-six House seats were open in the 2010 election, an increase of 13 from 2008.

The 111 candidates for the 26 open seats reported raising a total of \$2,837,896, or an average of \$25,566, and reported a total of \$2,795,149 in expenditures, or an average of \$25,181. The top spender won in 20 of the 26 open races. The six winners who were outspent in their races were Gailanne Cariddi, Paul Brodeur, Rhonda Nyman, Angelo D’Emilia, Kimberly Ferguson and Richard Bastien.

The most expensive race for an open seat was in the 4<sup>th</sup> Suffolk District, where five candidates spent a total of \$280,601, or an average of \$56,120. The winner, Nicholas Collins, was also the top spender in that race at \$120,062.

## **V. Starting Balances**

Candidates for the House had a total of \$6,378,377 on hand at the start of the 2010 election, a drop of \$325,148 from 2008. The \$6,703,525 on hand in 2008 is the highest amount ever recorded for House candidates in an OCPF study.

A head start in fundraising is often accompanied by success at the polls: of the total amount on hand at the start of the 2010, 94 percent was held by eventual winners.

Three of 10 candidates with the 10 largest starting balances faced opposition.

The 134 incumbents seeking re-election had \$6,075,520 at the start of the year, an average of \$45,339. The average starting balance for incumbents in 2008 was \$44,316.

The list of candidates with the 10 highest starting balances consists entirely of incumbents, all of whom won re-election in 2010.

The largest starting balances in 2008 and 2010 belonged to incumbent Thomas Petrolati.

A total of 131 candidates started the year with no money on hand. Twenty of those candidates won their races.

## **VI. Most Active Candidates and Races**

While 94 of the 160 seats in the House were contested in the 2010 election, each election varied in factors such as the level of competition and campaign finance activity. Twenty-five races featured total expenditures that exceeded \$100,000, four more than in 2008. Six of the 10 races with the highest expenditures were for open House seats.

The most expensive House race was in the 19<sup>th</sup> Suffolk District, where unopposed House Speaker Robert DeLeo spent a total of \$383,803. A total of \$2.1 million was spent in the ten races listed below, 22 percent of the overall total for House candidates in 2010.

The least expensive contested election was in the 5<sup>th</sup> Middlesex District, a race with two candidates and total expenditures of \$5,010. Incumbent Rep. David Linsky reported expenditures of \$3,788 and won, and challenger Christopher Travis Resmini reported expenditures of \$1,221.

## TOP FUNDRAISERS AND SPENDERS

The list of the top 10 House fundraisers in 2010 was made up of six incumbents and all were Democrats. Eight of the top ten fundraisers were in contested races.

House Speaker Robert DeLeo of Winthrop topped the fundraising list, raising \$462,596 in 2010, the highest amount of receipts ever recorded by a House candidate in an OCPF study. The previous high was \$370,641 in 2002, set by former Speaker Thomas Finneran of Boston.

The top ten list of candidates in terms of expenditures is made up of seven re-elected incumbents.

House Speaker Robert DeLeo reported spending the most in 2010: \$383,803. In 2008, former House Speaker Salvatore DiMasi broke the expenditure record, making \$475,984 in expenditures, \$68,752 more than the previous high set in 2002.

Eight candidates reported no expenditures in 2010, and all were unsuccessful. The winning candidate with the lowest expenditure total was incumbent Rep. Thomas Conroy, who spent \$1,101.

### **VII. Ending Balances**

Candidates for the House in 2010 reported a total ending balance of \$5,785,773. That is \$592,604 less than what was held at the start of the year. The ending balance is also \$874,927 less than the corresponding figure from 2008.<sup>1</sup>

All of the candidates with the ten highest ending balances were incumbent Democrats.

The highest ending balances in 2000, 2002 and 2004 had been posted by then-Speaker Finneran, whose highest figure was \$472,331 in 2002. Incumbent Thomas Petrolati, D-Springfield, broke Finneran's record in 2008 with an ending balance of \$484,675. Petrolati ended 2010 with the highest ending balance, \$481,497.
